Those of you who were in Christchurch after the 2010-11 earthquakes will remember the inconvenience of having to dig a hole in the garden or making a dash to a 'port-a-loo' in the street because Christchurch's waste-water drainage pipes were shattered.

Older residents may remember the potty under the bed and the spidery shed in the back yard. But before that, of course, was the long-drop in the country and the night cart collection in town.


The photo (1) right, is my picture of the remains of a back yard toilet shed in Poulson Street, presumably revealed by earth-quake shaking. The next pictures are courtesy of Dave Gorton. Photo (2) shows the remains of the old prison block designed by Benjamin Mountford between Lincoln Road and Dickens Street, and (3) is a view inside one of the prison cells in a newer block. The remaining prison building was converted into a backpackers lodge in 2006.

My final photo (4) shows an example of the ubiquitous portable toilet. They are always important conveniences at popup events, but were vital to many Christchurch residents after the 2011 quake.

This one is still within a stone's throw of St Marys, but I won't tell where. (Ed.)





CYCLEWAY/TRAFFIC PROBLEMS

This week I met with CCC Project Manager Team for the Little River Link to discuss concerns regarding vehicles driving on the cycleway in Grove Road when two oncoming vehicles enter Grove Road at the same time. The idea is that the vehicle heading toward Church Square should pull over in a driveway gap to allow the other vehicle to continue down to the roundabout. However, what often occurs is that the vehicle drives down the length of the cycleway using it as a road. Frequently there is not enough room for a car to smoothly enter a driveway space either.

The Project team will now look at installing white bollards along the edge of the cycleway at reasonably close spacing that will deter vehicles from driving along the path. This will remove the wide space that drivers perceive they can use to drive along and will force them to wait for a gap. The Project team are also investigating putting a gap that vehicles can pull into when faced with oncoming traffic. In relation to Brougham Street, they will be installing a 'No Entry' sign to reinforce this as an 'exit only' from Collins Street.
