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OLD ADDINGTON: An update on Enfield Villa, Burke Street.

A LOCAL RESIDENT WRITES:

The reason for getting in touch with you today is rather sad. The Enfield Villa at 26 Burke Street that you have already mentioned in your October 2015 issue is very likely to be lost. The Villa was sold last summer from one investor to the next and now the new owner has signalled that the house will be pulled down to make room for more town houses. I supplied the known history of the 152 year old house to the owner (plus an old photograph) and pleaded to the owner to spare the house. It looks rough on the outside but it is a well-built house, surviving all earthquakes with nearly no damage. It would make a lovely family home or a fabulous community house once restored. The owner kindly answered my letter but not with positive news and referred to the house as 'old stuff' that needs to go.

The neighbours in Burke St, Brent (the current tenant), and everyone knowing the house, is very sad to hear about the house that is doomed and my thought was that maybe the whole community would like to know what is happening. I have attached the history that we have of the house and also an old photograph. **Gudrun Judy Frings.**

In March 1864, Henry Bull, a market gardener, bought 1 acre, more or less, of Aikman's 7 acres, paying £100 for it. The price suggests that today's villa, 26 Burke Street, was already standing on the land when Bull bought it. A date of about 1862-63 for the building of the early cottage is confirmed by the use of newspaper, dated December 15, 1862, to paper the walls of one of the upper rooms. (The paper was discovered by the present owner.) The original style is also compatible with its having been built in the early 1860s. For a property owner and speculator like Aikman to build on, and subdivide, larger areas of land on what were then the outskirts of Christchurch was a quite usual business practice of those times.

It seems almost certain that Henry Bull and his family were the first to occupy the cottage as neither LeCren nor Aikman, the two immediate previous owners, appear to have lived in the area. The one reason to think that the cottage could perhaps have been built in the 1870s is that in 1876 Henry Bull took out a mortgage of £200 to the Trust and Agency Company of Australasia on the property. This may have been to finance the construction of a larger house than was already standing on the property, but with all the other evidence pointing to a date of 1862-63 for the construction of the cottage it is more likely that some other turn in Henry Bull's affairs had made necessary raising his mortgage on his family home. Certainly, when he died in August 1891 and left 1 acre 5 perches 'with dwelling house and outbuildings in his occupation' to his wife and sons, Bull was referring to the present cottage. The will left the property to his wife, Martha Sarah Bull, for her life. On her death it was to pass to his five surviving sons and the children of a sixth son already deceased. (*Photographs below show that the cottage has been substantially extended over time. It is currently known as Enfield Villa.*)

Phone Pals is a group run out of addington.net where both android and apple users meet up to share and learn more about using their phones and tablets.

Recently we learned about using Google Photos to utilise the cloud for permanent storage so we don't lose our photos if our device dies or is misplaced. Most devices now come with this app installed. However, it is also available free from the Google Play Store (the Google Photos logo looks like a windmill toy). It was very easily installed and it automatically uploaded all the existing photos from my tablet. When I went to a desk-top computer (and signed in to google using my gmail address) I then typed 'google photos' into the web browser and there were all my photos ready and waiting.

Google Photos comes with a number of interesting features such as using albums to catalogue photos. There is an animation feature which utilises similar photos to create a short animated sequence. Google Photos can be used to store the videos that you make. It has also has a feature that permits sharing with others.

With Google Photos you do not need to worry unduly about privacy. You are protected because you sign in using your own password. There is also the option of utilising the Google two-factor authentication process for added peace of mind.

NEW WARD BOUNDARY

I attended the Representation Hearing Review Panel as the Community Development Worker in Addington, speaking on behalf of the Addington residents and groups who expressed their concerns and wishes. The Representation Review is now available on the CCC website. Essentially the changes include increasing Councillors from 13 to 16 - not including the Mayor— one Councillor for each of the 16 Wards, 6 urban and 1 Banks Peninsula Community Board and fewer Community Board Elected Members. The Ward boundaries have changed, and what this means for Addington is that this suburb is spread across three Wards with the boundaries being Selwyn Street and the railway line across Whiteleigh Avenue. The majority of Addington will be in the new Spreydon Ward, but the Community Board will have fewer members than the current one. This will be effective at the start of the Local Body elections in October this year. Manuka Cottage will again host a 'Meet the Candidate' event so watch this space!
