OLD ADDINGTON: Recorded in stained glass

The Anglican Church of St Mary the Virgin in Addington now has a number of very beautiful stained glass windows which have been donated over a number of years.

One of the most beautiful is the Haxell window. This was commissioned and installed in the west wall of the nave, below the rose window, by Mr George Haxell in memory of his late wife Margaret. The window was installed in 1982 and it follows the Gothic revival form advocated by Victorian settlers as being most suitable for churches.

A close-up of the right hand section of the triptych is shown in the photo (top,right) because this is the section that relates to the early settlement of Addington. It shows the church as it was in 1887, with a simple worker's cottage and a working class couple. The woman is wearing a shawl and a long gown protected by an apron. She holds her baby and is embraced by an older child. Beside her, the man is wearing a shirt and trousers. His shirt has no collar and his sleeves are rolled up ready for manual work.

Other parts of the window emphasise the glory of God but this section is especially relevant to Heritage Week, celebrated at St Mary's in October.

Another interesting fact about the Haxell window, is that it was designed by a woman, Beverly Shore Bennett, who trained at the Wellington Techinical College. The window was made by glass workers at Miller Studios in Dunedin. (Ed.)



TRADING BETWEEN TIMEBANKS

While Timebanking is most often used as a way to build community in a particular place, there are times when Timebank members have chosen to trade with people in other parts of New Zealand. Obviously if you need help with doing physical things, you need to get someone living locally to assist. However if you are doing things that involve talking or computer work, or even renting a holiday home, you can trade with people from other Timebanks and in fact you may not be able to access some of those more specialist services locally.

There are between 20 and 30 Timebanks around the country so being able to intertrade can widen the scope of what is on offer using Timebank credits. Members of different Timebanks have accessed counselling, computer assistance, help with writing etc, graphics work, or asking someone to work through some issues. One person we heard of even paid for holiday accommodation using time credits. In today's world of skype, cheap phone calls, computers, email and other forms of communication, all of this becomes possible.

In general, you will need the assistance of your Timebank

coordinators to sort our how the trade actually happens on the computer, but you can find and set up the trades. Again, feel free to contact Chrys (Ph 0272 86 86 53) or Gen (021 134 5802) to discuss this more if you are interested in trading with someone from another Timebank.

By the way – Addington Timebank has just got a new logo. Marie Ockelford from New Brighton is a graphic artist who developed the logo in exchange for time credits. We love it! Hope you do too!


