

Parihaka Day: 5 November 2012

Open day at Addington Prison, Christchurch

In my thoughts I had imagined I would be imprisoned one day for, my wrong doings, but here I was walking, not into prison itself, but a backpackers' accommodation block fitted out with a warm welcome. An ex-chaplain, Father Jim Consedine, welcomed us with a broad grin on his face and brandishing cheeky comments such as "Where is the payment?" In fact I knew this gentleman from the Catholic Worker's House where I meet others on a Wednesday night for a church service and community meal. I felt relaxed in his company and he began to inform us (my companion, Elaine from Manuka Cottage, and me) about Parihaka Day.

The people of Parihaka were pacifists in their own right. Men women and children made a peaceful stand against the Pakeha army who were invading their land in Taranaki. On 5 November, 1888, the men were rounded up and sent

to various places around NZ. Two chiefs, Te Whiti and Tohu, were sent to Addington Prison where I believe they were treated well. Other prisoners were sent to Otago where they were malnourished and overworked and many died

"Fireworks Day, celebrated in New Zealand on 5 November should be called Parihaka Day," challenged Father Jim. For most New Zealanders Parihaka Day goes unnoticed. Why not teach about it in schools and inform the wider population? We should not forget our own stories; we should not

let our voices go up in smoke; our stories should be echoed across the land, the seas, the skies and the universe.

OLD HOUSES - An "Everybody's Butchery" Story

If you own a very old house in Addington and are cerned for its future Graham Robinson would like to hear



"There are houses in this area not listed by the Historic Places Trust but their owners want to save them. There may be a group of owners who share the belief that these houses should be kept and looked after rather than turned into multiple townhouses on one site. I would like them to please contact me."

It's fitting that Graham Robinson is concerned about the future of some of Addington's oldest buildings. He and his wife Paulette live in an Addington house built way back in 1864 - that's a hundred and forty eight years ago - and own a shop that dates back to July 1906. You will find them behind the counter at "Everybody's Butchery" an Addington landmark that has been a butcher's shop since it was built at the start of last century.

"Everybody's Butchery" on Selwyn Street has a frontage very different to the buildings to left and right of it. It harks back happily to the days of the local butcher. Graham says "In 1980 there were 300 butcher shops in Christchurch now there is only about forty."

Not surprisingly, the buildings around the shop have had other lives over the years. The kindy next door was a coal merchant's in the 1930s. The Mainland Paints building over the road used to be a printers' ink manufacturer and a hosiery factory before that. Everybody's Butchery pre-dates the car so it's no surprise there were once stables out the back.

Paulette says theirs is a "destination shop". Their tend to be regulars who know what they want to buy. "We do our own bacon, ham and small goods. We are very old-

fashioned." That's echoed in the old-style till and dial telephone they use.

A long-time butcher, Graham learned the trade from his father. For the last five years Paulette has worked in the shop too and is involved with meat preparation as well as serving at counter. Graham would like to retire but wants to see the business go to owners who will carry on the tradition he and Paulette have built up. The meat is not pre-cut and not pre-packaged.

Paulette thinks that since February 22nd Everybody's Butchery has been a pleasingly solid presence for people who have coped with a lot of change. It has a community aspect to it: "We bring fruit and veges to the shop (to give away) but other people do too. That's just sharing with the community".

The shop itself has had an upgrade since the earthquakes. The brick side walls have been replaced by reinforced concrete block walls up to the current building standard and CERA has just approved the Robinson's engineer's Detailed Engineering Evaluation (DEE).

It's not surprising, all things considered, that Graham would like to hear from people who want to retain Addington's oldest homes and with it, some of Addington's traditional character.
